Joseph Lavadour I Family 1791-1892 Lavadour often spelled Laverdure

Joseph Lavadour and two brothers: Louis & Chas. Came from Canada, from the Province of Quebec. In 1805 Joseph I was employed by N.W. Company & Hudson Bay Fur Company. In a company of seventy five (75) men, was stationed at English River. Louis was in a company of thriynine (39) men at Fort Dauplin; which Charles served with a company of sixty (60) MEN AT Fort Praires.

My knowledge of Louis & Charles is very scant. But they took leave and went into Montana — married women from that Reservation territory and settled down rearing their children. During the year of the Depression some of these families moved into Idaho. Joseph Lavadour I married Lissette Walla Walla of the Walla Walla Tribe. So he and wife were residing at Waiilatpu (wii eel a poo) during the Whitman Massacre Nov. 29, 1847. Following this tragedy they traveled southward again via Wallula. Their fourth child Xavier was born near river April 14, 1842 and died Apr. 7 1936. Buried by the graves of his parents in St. Andrews Catholic Mission Cemetery east of Pendleton, Oregon.

At or near Yreka, California Joseph II was born Mar. 2, 1854. His younger sister Isabella (French) was born there two years later.

After a lapse of years in May or June 1857 they returned to Oregon. Took a homestead in Umpqua Valley. On this land stood the old "Lavadour School" christened in his honor. Also "Lavadour Cemetery."

Sometime prior to 1887 they abandoned this homestead and migrated to the Umatilla Indian Reservation – a farming location near Pendleton, Oregon. To this union were born 8 (eight) children: 4 sons and 4 daughters. Namely: Xavier – Joseph – Narcisse – Scott – Angelique –

Isabelle, Emelie and Marguerite. All of this generation is now deceased. All are buried in Eastern Oregon Angelique, Emelie and Marguerite. Joseph Lavadour II and wife Mary Alice Bigham of Adams, Oregon were my parents. Father passed away Mar. 17, 1940 and Mother on May 16, 1942. Both buried in Athena, Ore. Cemetary. To this couple were born seven children. The eldest surviving heir is myself Martha Oralee Kirk (83 yrs. of age, Cayuse, Oregon). Second eldest is my brother Albert Lavadour (81 years of age) Pendleton, Oregon. And then my sister Iva Erickson (76 yrs. of age) Santa Rose, California.

The third and fourth generations of Jos. And Lissette Lavadour are numerous and scattered throughout Oregon, Wash, Idaho and as far north as Calgary, Alberta, Canada. Martha O. Lavadour Kirk

These baptisms were made by the missionary priest Father Poulin on a mission tour through Southern Ore in 1860. The records were brought back to Oregon City to be entered in the register there, Father Poulin's "home base." Tehre was no church as yet in Douglas Co.

Lavadour, Emelie (1841 -)

Married Thomas Salden Sept. 18, 1861 "of Douglas County." At that time Emelie's 3 children by some former alliance, no name given, were baptized by Father Blanchet on a pastoral visit to Southern Ore. 1. Rose Lavadour, 7 years. 2 Margaret Lavadour 5 years, 3. Henery Lavadour 4 years.

A fourth child, Martha, daughter of Emelie and Thomas Salden (Sadden) was also baptized, aged 11 months Oregon City Bk. 1, p. 42

Lavadour, Elizabeth (Isabel) (1855 -)

Baptized "on the south Umpqua" 5 years old, July 29, 1860, Oregon City, Bk. I, p. 33

Lavadour, Xavier – no church record except that he was godfather to Joseph Groslouis "on Day's Creen, 12 miles from Canyonvolle" on June 30, 1869, Roseburg Register, Bk. L, p. 20

State of Washington County of Umatilla

Comes now Mrs. Mary Alice Lavadour of Adams, Oregon, who makes the following statement.

I have known Mrs. Anna McGinnis since I can remember as her brother was my stepfather. I know that her father was a white man and that her mother was a full blood Indian woman of the Walla Walla tribe. She lived on this reservation and died on this Umatilla Reservation. Her name was Lizzie Lavadour. She had selected land for an allotment, had it fenced and partly plowed by died in January before the allotments were made in the fall of the same year and therefore she was not allotted.

Anna McGinnis has never lived on the reservation. She went to California with her mother when she was a small girl and married a white man there named John McGinnis and when she was about 18 years old returned to Oregon and settled at Azalea where she has lived with her husband ever since. Four of her brothers and one sister were allotted on this reservation but at the time of the allotments she had several small children and they were poor and she did not make the trip to the Umatilla Reservation to make claim for an allotment. The names of her brothers who were allotted on the Umatilla Reservation are Nelson or Narcisse Lavadour, Xavier Lavadour, Joseph Lavadour, and Scott Lavadour and her sister is Isabel French.

Joey Lavadour's emails:

My grandmother Edna Bellinger always told me that she was born at Calapooia, Oregon. She said it was in Linn County. She shared with me that when she was 9yrs old that she was living with her mother, Rose Christine Chalifoux Bellinger and Edna's brothers and sisters on the Calapooia River. Rose had TB. They were starving and surviving on crawfish and living in a shipping crate shelter waiting for their father, Edward Bellinger (a master carpenter), to send money from Pendleton. They finally received the money and came by train to Pendleton and the children we placed in the St. Andrews Mission Boarding School. Rose died and is buried at Athena Cemetery. Edward lived to old age here and died in the late 1930's. Edna's birthday was September 21, 1889. We always celebrated my birthday at the same time, sept.22,1954. Rose's birthday was sept. 23.
